GUIDING LIGHT FROM THE GROTTA

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Friends in Christ:

In the new year, Fr. Jim has invited me to submit a monthly column to the bulletin. While thinking of what I could write about, I thought of the year ahead. It just so happens that the Apostles' Creed, one of the foundations of our faith, is traditionally divided into twelve articles. Thus, I thought that it could be a beneficial spiritual exercise to offer a reflection each month on each of these articles.

The Apostles Creed is the most ancient of our creeds. A tradition of the Church tells us that the Twelve Apostles, meeting in Jerusalem, formulated this creed, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, before being dispersed on their various missionary journeys throughout the known world.¹ This ensured that there was a consistency and coherence in the truths that the Apostles preached. By the year 390 the creed had already been referred to as the Apostles Creed by the great Father of the Church, St. Ambrose of Milan.² In 449, Pope St. Leo the Great noted that the Apostles' Creed was divided into twelve articles³ and another tradition held that each of the Apostles contributed one article to the Creed.⁴

When we speak of a "creed" in the Church we are speaking of a statement of beliefs. The English word "creed" comes from the Latin word *credere* which literally means "to believe." The Latin word "*credo*" begins the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds. This is literally translated as "I believe."

We may remember a decade ago when the English translation of the Mass was revised in 2011. Before this revision, when we recited the Nicene Creed after the homily, we would state, "We believe in one God." However, this was never a precise translation. The Nicene Creed begins with the word "*Credo*" and therefore the current "I believe in One God" is much more accurate.

"I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth"

Naturally, our statement of Christian belief must begin with the foundation and center of our faith: "I believe in God." The religions of the ancient pagans of Egypt, Greece, and Rome were polytheistic, believing in a multitude of different gods. In contrast, the people of Israel were unique in that they were monotheists, believing in one God. The Book of Deuteronomy states: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might."⁵ These words comprise a portion of the *Shema Yisrael*, a prayer which faithful Jews recite every day, reminding them of their faith in the one God. This one God is the God who revealed himself to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the _____

Old Testament. This is the same God who delivered Moses and the people of Israel out of slavery in Egypt. It is also significant that we should refer to God as “Father.” Modern society likes to equate the “Fatherhood” of God as an act of patriarchal oppression. However, this critique is suggested by a society which, because of the modern breakdown of the family, has a perverse and incomplete understanding of what true fatherhood consists of.

“Father” gods and “Mother” goddesses were known to the ancient pagan religions. However, the fatherhood of the God of Israel denotes a unique relationship that He has with humanity: “Is not [the Lord] your father, who created you, who made you and established you?”⁶ God is the father of the people of Israel. This Sunday’s reading from the Prophet Isaiah compares the love that God has for Zion with the love between a husband and wife: “[A]s a bridegroom rejoices in his bride so shall your God rejoice in you.”⁷ But the fatherhood of God is not a simple analogy. With the coming of Christ, it becomes an opportunity for an intimate and personal relationship with the Creator of the Universe.

When we refer to God as “Almighty” we are stating our belief in God’s omnipotence. The Greek word used is *pantokrator*, which literally means “ruler of all.”⁸ The Fourth Lateran Council (1215) expanded upon this by describing the one God as “eternal, infinite and unchangeable, incomprehensible, almighty, and ineffable.”⁹ God is all-knowing and all-powerful. It is through this power that he is “creator of heaven and earth.” The universe did not come into existence randomly or arbitrarily. Instead, God created the world and humanity to inhabit it as an act of love. The Book of Genesis tells us that “God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.”¹⁰ One of the lessons in the Baltimore Catechism perfectly encapsulates our reason for existence (some of our parishioners, remembering these lessons from their childhood, may already know what I am referring to). According to the Catechism, God made us “to know Him, to love Him, and to serve Him in this world, and to be happy with Him for ever in heaven.”

As the creator of heaven and earth, God is often referred to as the “prime mover.” Nothing exists without His willing it. Even the angels of Heaven were created by Him. God’s creation of the universe is referred to by Saint Thomas Aquinas in his first of five proofs for God’s existence. Aquinas maintained that nothing can move itself and something else must set it into motion. Thus, knowing that the world and the universe did not always exist, we conclude that existence had to be set into motion by a first, infinite mover who existed before all else. We understand this first mover to be God. Dante Alighieri describes this understanding of God beautifully at the end of his *Divine Comedy* when he describes God as “the Love that moves the Sun and the other stars.”¹¹

Reflection for Next Sunday, January 23, 2022

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: *Nehemiah 8:2-4a,5-6,8-10*

Second Reading: *1 Corinthians 12:12-30*

Gospel: *Luke 1:1-14; 4:14-21*

In the synagogue at Nazareth, Jesus reads aloud from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah and announces that this Scripture is now fulfilled.

Family Connection

Jesus was the one sent by God to bring salvation to the world. Jesus announced that mission using the framework we hear in today's Gospel from the prophet Isaiah: glad tidings will be brought to the poor, liberty to captives, recovery of sight for the blind, and freedom for the oppressed. Jesus inaugurates the Kingdom of God in his person—through his life, death, and Resurrection. We are charged with the task of continuing the mission that Jesus began. Jesus set the framework for all of us when he announced his ministry in today's Gospel. Jesus also gave us the helper we would need to enable us to participate in his mission. The Holy Spirit has been given to us so that we, the Church, might serve the Kingdom of God.

Gather with your family and suggest that they try to picture the vision that Jesus describes using the words of the prophet Isaiah as you read today's Gospel, Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21. Think about your neighborhood, your community. What are the situations and who are the people who most need to see this vision fulfilled? What steps would be necessary to make the vision a reality for them? Make a family commitment to pray for the Kingdom of God and to take a particular action that will address a need you see in your community. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you by praying the Prayer to the Holy Spirit.
